## BIRDS AND OTHER THINGS THAT FLY



### Parlor Art Gallery August 2013 Charles Peterson Photographs

This exhibit was inspired primarily by a trip to the St Augustine Alligator Farm in April/May of 2012. Herons and Egrets flock to this location to nest and raise their young. It's a great place to photograph these magnificent creatures.

As I was putting it together, I guess my love of nature in general kicked in and I started looking at other examples I had photographed of things that fly. Nature has been a part of my life since I can remember. Growing up next to a forest preserve, my friends and I spent as much time as possible exploring the woods and fishing in Salt Creek. My dad would take us fishing before I could go on my own and we would catch Bullheads. By the time we moved from that location 11 years later, there was nothing left in the creek to catch due to pollution. Of course, I didn't realize that until later, after I had begun a career in landscape architecture and I started getting involved in Wetland Mitigation and Prairie Restoration. As the issue of pollution became more and more of an issue, I realized why, after only a few years, the creek we thought was alive and well had died.

What happened to Salt Creek was happening all over the country and, indeed, the world. And it had been happening for a long time. As I have shown in some of these photographs, the feathers of these birds are beautiful. In the early 1900's, they adorned the hats of millions of women around the world and, because of the demand for their feathers, these birds almost became extinct.

Today, we are facing additional attacks on our environment. The Honey Bee is an example of this. As our increasing population puts more demand on food production, increased use of pesticides is reducing the Honey Bee population. Since bees are responsible for the pollination of 30% of our nation's food crops, it is essential we find a way to protect them.

Dragonflies and Robber Flies are essential predators of other insects in the environment and help to keep the whole insect population in balance.

Which brings us back to birds. Birds eat insects. Insects pollinate plants. Plants provide the energy for ALL living things.

## Having The Conversation

There may come a time when children must have a conversation with their parents about how long they can live independently in their own home. Or, for the aging parent, there might come a day when a child relays concerns. Conversations such as this are difficult to have and they are even harder to begin.

Beginning the talks with your aging parents needs to be like learning to swim. You start with learning to hold your breath and put your face underwater. You don't start with the swimming leg of a triathlon.

With an estimated 76 million baby boomers in the United States, this is the generation that's facing these conversations. The earlier children talk with their parents about issues such as how long mom or dad can live in their own home or drive their own car, the better. It's a good idea to start having conversations about your parents' future even before you see changes in them---before you are in crisis mode. Crisis leads to confused elders, disorganized yet well-meaning children, and a family in chaos.

You'll want to start small. And you do want to start now. Start while your aging parents are fairly healthy. That way you do have the time to build slowly and have conversations about every area of their life and health without panic or pressure.

Discussions conducted with careful consideration, respect, and solid information work best. Remember when you think about HOW to have your conversation to frame it around the five most important considerations for aging seniors: security, freedom, peace of mind, friends, and choices. How can your parents best achieve these things.

Start by setting the T-E-M-P-O...*Timing, Experience, Motivation, Place, Outcome.*

**Timing**—You'll want to time your conversations appropriately. Make sure all parties involved have time to talk and to listen.

**Experience**—Often you can open the door to talk to elderly parents by tying your specific topic to direct experience. “Mom, I just finished working with my lawyer on updating my will. I was wondering when the last time was you looked at yours.”

**Motivation**—Be clear about your motive for asking. If you are frustrated or angry, it is not the time to engage in an important conversation about the future. Your motivation needs to be solely for safety, well-being and quality of life.

**Place**—Create some safe space to have this conversation. The holiday dinner table is likely not the place to talk about a sensitive issue.

**Outcome**—What you're trying to establish is an ongoing, honest conversation about everything related to your parent's future. You're laying the ground work to understand your parent's feelings, wishes and needs. You want to get information and to share information

The idea of “parenting your parents” starts with a benign agenda of providing care and help at a time when your parents may need it. The problem is that to stay in that mindset, you quickly lose perspective on what the appropriate roles really are.

No matter how frail or ill your parents become, they will always be your parents. We must take care to never diminish that respect or their independence. Try a switch from “parent your parents” to “partner with your parents.” This shift of perspective can make a huge difference. As a parent you are in charge. You make the rules and set the agenda. As a partner you have a common goal and a mutual interest. You figure out how to collaborate for a common purpose. As a parent your values are what matter. As a partner you share what's important to you, but also listen to understand the values, goals and needs of your partner.

If you are reading this and realize you are the “aging parent” referred to above, be the one to start the conversation with your adult children. Believe me, as a person with aging parents, this is on their minds. My parents have done this for my sisters and me and it is a gift.

As a first experience going to Night Ministry (July 23), the night did not go at all as the way we thought it would. We were positioned in Lakeview, on a relatively commercial street. We could tell that there were regular attendees to the Night Ministry van that night, as well as some passers-by who could pick up some food walking back from their late night jobs. The majority of the community that came by was African-American youth, most likely between the ages of 18 and 25. Not one person who came through the food line was ungrateful or cold shouldered to us. The attitudes of these people showed that they have been resilient in their hard times and that coming to get food from the Night Ministry truly was something they valued. There was always a "thank you" of some sort, and most everyone that got food looked you in the eye and responded genuinely when we asked how they were doing. Most were witty and would make light conversation, which made serving these people not a chore, but something to enjoy.

One of the most interesting aspects of this community was the diversity in gender identification. Being close to the Boy's Town neighborhood of Chicago, we had many eccentric and bold personalities, even some memorable outfits (such as bright blue feathered hair with sparkling battery powered lights). Despite the difference in personal identity and comfort zones, the interaction from our volunteers to these people was nothing short of enjoyable and downright fun.

As the food line dwindled and a crowd began to build in the parking lot next to us, we had the wild experience of learning to jump double-dutch from some of the people we had fed just minutes earlier. Not only were we allowed to participate, but encouraged to try jumping and be a part of their community as it existed in their own element.

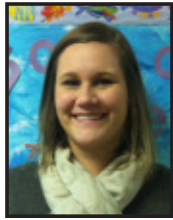
#### *A Fine Balance* by Rohinton Mistry

With a compassionate realism and narrative sweep that recall the work of Charles Dickens, this magnificent novel captures all the cruelty and corruption, dignity and heroism, of India. # Who's in the Pews?

On July 14, Kim Barth was introduced as our congregation's new Connections Coordinator. But wait a minute, wasn't Kim Barth introduced as the new Swing Set Director last July? Hey, I'm confused! Is this the same Kim Barth?

Yes it is!

"I am thrilled that Kim is our newest staff member, Connections Coordinator," said Wyonne Hegland, Church Council President. "Her enthusiasm and energy made her a perfect choice."

"I looked at the position and looked at the position over and over again," said Kim, who grew up with 2 sisters and 1 brother in Carol Stream, but now lives in Wheaton. "I would never want either job to interfere with the other. I'm a prideful person and wouldn't want my work to look sloppy or that I hadn't done it to the best of my abilities."

If Kim's first year as Swing Set Director is any indication of her "abilities", we're "cooking with a blue flame" as my sister says!

A 2010 graduate in Elementary Education from Northern Illinois University, Kim started at Swing Set in 2011 teaching 3 year olds. "I did my student teaching in the kindergarten level and was hooked," said Kim beaming. "I realized I wouldn't want to teach anything higher than kindergarten. The kids are so innocent, so cute and so playful. I love it."

The opportunity to teach those lovable tykes didn't come right away, however. "I started as a nanny for a family in St. Charles after college because I couldn't find a full time teaching position," said Kim. "The boys I stayed with went to Swing Set and their mom, in a conversation with Sue Farr, discovered they needed a 3 year old teacher." One great recommendation and an interview later-the job was hers.

For as long as she can remember, which at her age (25) isn't as difficult for her as it is for some of the rest of us, she's always wanted to be a teacher. "A lot of that had to do with the teachers I had and the relationships I had with them," said Kim, who admits to being teacher's pet.

When Sue Farr, director of Swing Set, announced her retirement in 2011, Kim was approached and asked if she might be interested in the position. Was she interested, "Of course!" But was she ready to give up the day-to-day's a little tough, but she decided to take the leap and interviewed for the job.

Kim was hired in May of 2012 as the new director and spent the entire summer collecting her thoughts, preparing, familiarizing, organizing and asking for help from those "upstairs and downstairs". "At first it was a little overwhelming, but by the time school started we were ready," she smiled. "I never thought in a million years I'd be as happy as I am. I absolutely love this job."

During her first year as Director, Kim achieved some major goals she set for herself-improving enrollment, bringing the teachers closer together and working with the teachers, initiating new enrichment classes.

Enrollment was down when Kim took over and there was talk that there might come a time when a couple of classes would be closed. "All but one class is now on a wait list," said Kim, who was very creative in promoting Swing Set to the public. "We had a budget of \$25 for publicity," she laughed. She found that writing a heartfelt editorial about something or someone at the school was just as effective as any big expensive ad.

"The enrollment has increased through her efforts of reaching out to the community and promoting the program," said Wyonne. "She is one who thinks out of the box."

Kim also faced the challenge of managing a "veteran" teaching staff. So she engaged the teachers in open dialogue about new ideas, what was important for the children, the school and the teachers while building a camaraderie among the staff. (There are 8 teachers including Kim)

"I feel very happy about this past year," said Kim, who knew every child's name and got into the classrooms as often as she possibly could. "We worked out all of our transitioning pieces last summer and we're all here together with the exact same goal. We want these kids to go into kindergarten prepared, excited and loving school."

Now, along with her Swing Set duties, Kim will be using her energy, "out of the box" thinking and good listening skills, to promote and connect our church while coordinating the efforts to do so.

"As Connections Coordinator she will be working with our entire congregation as well as new members," said Wyonne. "It will be her responsibility to help connect members and visitors into the life and ministries of our church."

Kim looks forward to and is certainly up to the task, but as they say, "it takes a village." Let's all be a part of her vision and the Connection!

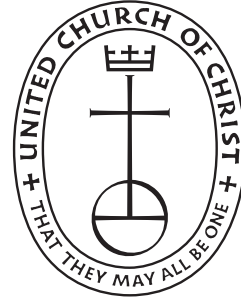

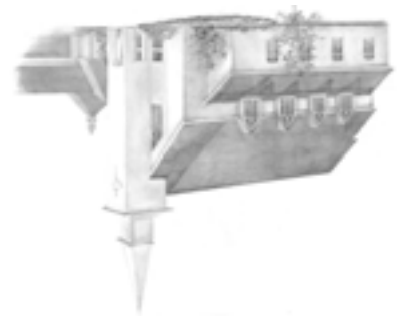
