September 14th: FURY FROM THE TOMB

by SA Sidor; discussion at the home of Josephine and Peter Ball

Saqqara, Egypt, 1888, and in the booby-trapped tomb of an ancient sorcerer, Rom, a young Egyptologist, makes the discovery of a lifetime: five coffins and an eerie, oversized sarcophagus. But the expedition seems cursed, for after unearthing the mummies, all but Rom die horribly. He faithfully returns to America with his disturbing cargo, continuing by train to Los Angeles, home of his reclusive sponsor. When the train is hijacked by murderous banditos in the Arizona desert, who steal the mummies and flee over the border, Rom – with his benefactor's rebellious daughter, an orphaned Chinese busboy, and a cold-blooded gunslinger – must ride into Mexico to bring the malevolent mummies back. If only mummies were their biggest problem... "Fury From the Tomb is a fun, dark fantasy that feels a bit like Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom. With creepy mummies, claustrophobic tombs, ghouls, and vampires – this story doesn't lack for danger and suspense. It's action-packed excitement from beginning to end... I thoroughly enjoyed this start to a new series. And I look forward to more of Rom's adventures." – SciFi Chick.

November 16th: WE ARE ALL COMPLETELY BESIDE OURSELVES by Karen Joy Fowler; discussion at the home of Mila and Mark Englert

The *New York Times* bestselling author of *The Jane Austen Book Club* introduces a middle-class American family, ordinary in every way but one... Meet the Cooke family: Mother and Dad, brother Lowell, sister Fern, and Rosemary, who begins her story in the middle. She has her reasons. "I was raised with a chimpanzee," she explains. "I tell you Fern was a chimp and already you aren't thinking of her as my sister. But until Fern's expulsion...she was my twin, my fun house mirror, my whirlwind other half and I loved her as a sister." As a child, Rosemary never stopped talking. Then, something happened, and Rosemary wrapped herself in silence. In *We Are All Completely Beside Ourselves*, Karen Joy Fowler weaves her most accomplished work to date—a tale of loving but fallible people whose well intentioned actions lead to heartbreaking consequences.

January 25th: DOUBLE INDEMNITY by James M. Cain; discussion at the home of Janet Zohorsky

James M. Cain, virtuoso of the roman noir, gives us a tautly narrated and excruciatingly suspenseful story in **Double Indemnity**, an X-ray view of guilt, of duplicity, and of the kind of obsessive, loveless love that devastates everything it touches. Walter Huff was an insurance salesman with an unfailing instinct for clients who might be in trouble, and his instinct led him to Phyllis Nirdlinger. Phyllis wanted to buy an accident policy on her husband. Then she wanted her husband to have an accident. Walter wanted Phyllis. To get her, he would arrange the perfect murder and betray everything he had ever lived for. Adapted into the 1944 classic film noir directed by Billy Wilder, starring Fred MacMurray and Barbara Stanwick.

March 8: LITTLE FIRES EVERYWHERE by Celeste Ng; discussion at the home of Trish and JT Thompson

The runaway *New York Times* bestseller from the bestselling author of *Everything I Never Told You*, a riveting novel that traces the intertwined fates of the picture-perfect Richardson family and the enigmatic mother and daughter who upend their lives. In Shaker Heights, a placid, progressive suburb of Cleveland, everything is planned – from the layout of the winding roads, to the colors of the houses, to the successful lives its residents will go on to lead. And no one embodies this spirit more than Elena Richardson, whose guiding principle is playing by the rules. Enter Mia Warren – an enigmatic artist and single mother – who arrives in this idyllic bubble with her teenaged daughter Pearl, and rents a house from the Richardsons. But Mia carries with her a mysterious past and a disregard for the status quo that threatens to upend this carefully ordered community. When old family friends of the Richardsons attempt to adopt a Chinese-American baby, a custody battle erupts that dramatically divides the town—and puts Mia and Elena on opposing sides. Suspicious of Mia and her motives, Elena is determined to uncover the secrets in Mia's past. But her obsession will come at unexpected and devastating costs. *Little Fires Everywhere* explores the weight of secrets, the nature of art and identity, and the ferocious pull of motherhood – and the danger of believing that following the rules can avert disaster. loving but fallible people whose well intentioned actions lead to heart-breaking consequences.

May 17th: LESS by Andrew Sean Greer; discussion at the home of Donna and Tony Giamberdino

What would possibly go wrong? Arthur Less will almost fall in love in Paris, almost fall to his death in Berlin, barely escape to a Moroccan ski chalet from a Saharan sandstorm, accidentally book himself as the (only) writer-in-residence at a Christian Retreat Center in Southern India, and encounter, on a desert island in the Arabian Sea, the last person on Earth he wants to face. Somewhere in there: he will turn fifty. Through it all, there is his first love. And there is his last. Because, despite all these mishaps, missteps, misunderstandings and mistakes, *Less* is, above all, a love story. A scintillating satire of the American abroad, a rumination on time and the human heart, a bittersweet romance of chances lost, by an author *The New York Times* has hailed as "inspired, lyrical," "elegiac," "ingenious," as well as "too sappy by half," *Less* shows a writer at the peak of his talents raising the curtain on our shared human comedy. Our Night Ministry trip in May began with a bit of a flurry - a last minute change of venue, the keys locked inside of the van followed by a desperate call to the Campton Hills police to help open the door. Crisis averted thanks to the two officers! Our van eventually departed CUCC and arrived safely in Chicago at 63rd and Halsted - the Back of the Yards neighborhood.

The Night Ministry's health van arrived several minutes earlier and prepared the serving tables for our coolers. CUCC church members had generously prepared sandwiches and cookies while others donated fruit, chips and water. We served a hungry group of children and adults who were patiently awaiting our arrival.

These details are more or less a part of every visit that we make to serve our neighbors in Chicago. While our food nourishes their bodies, our greater mission is to do justice and humbly serve with kindness. The most meaningful part of the evening for me was looking into the eyes of these humble people and seeing their need and their humanity. They have experienced hard times in one way or another. One man who was visually impaired needed some assistance gathering his food; another spunky woman who was pushing for her spot in the line needed a word of guidance. A man who had worked cleaning a nearby empty lot needed a good meal; others were mothers who needed to feed their children.

Some of these folks have suffered with physical or mental challenges for their entire lives; others have had a temporary setback. Some people are working but do not make enough money to feed their families. Some are unable to find a job - perhaps they lack training or are unable to be trained. Some suffer from mental illness. Regardless of the circumstances, these people are hungry. And we are in a position to help.

Some of our neighbors live lives far different from mine. Like many of us, I was born into a comfortable and able family that seems unremarkable and ordinary to me. However, to many people in the world, I have lived a life of privilege. With this perspective in mind, I feel called to give back to our community whether in the Tri-Cities, Chicago, Biloxi, or around the world. Micah reminds us to 'do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with our God.' Serving the clients of the Night Ministry allows me to see a broader face of humanity with their kind souls and very real needs. Although we give, we ultimately receive so much more. It is a personal blessing to serve the clients of the Night Ministry.

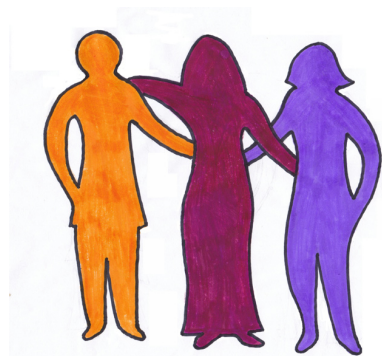
